The other day I was making my rounds when I overheard three guys talking. They had plans to go to Burge for lunch. Two of the guys had finished what they were doing, but the third guy said he had to go into the chapel and pray for a bit. There was a little push back about how hungry they were, but the guy in need of prayer held his ground. He said that prayer was something he wanted to be more intentional about. He might as well have said, "What are you really hungry for?" The response from the hungry guys was my breakthrough that day. Instead of continued griping, he said: "You know, you are right! I will come and pray with you." These are guys that you would see lifting at the gym at 6am. (If you are crazy enough to be active at that time of the morning.) They are fully living all that the university has to offer, but they want more. They are holding each other accountable to the highest level. And what is more, we are seeing more and more guys from the gym finding their way into the Newman Center. Because these guys know how to invite.

This is another facet of what we mean when we say, "We are **UNITED** in **CHRIST**." Our diversity is growing because our unity is working. We have much more to do, but relying on the grace of God and all the members of the Newman Center family, we are **Bold**, **Loving and Unstoppable**. I hope you can enjoy and celebrate all that we are doing here by reading some of our success stories.


Anna Kelly has served the Newman Catholic Student



FOCUS by the Numbers-Fall '23

- 30 Bible Study Groups
- 34 students leading Bible Study
- 165 students have attended Bible Study at least 1 time
- 60 students in Discipleship formation
- 7 students interviewing for an opportunity to become a FOCUS missionary next academic year

What is FOCUS?

The Fellowship of Catholic University Students is an effort across the country to advance the teachings of Jesus on college campuses. Our missionary team works in tandem with our campus ministry and complements the efforts of our Outreach and Education department.

We are blessed to be able to host this team thanks to the generosity of financial partners that specifically fund this ministry which has greatly increased our capacity for outreach on campus.

We experienced big changes in our FOCUS team to begin this academic year. Third year missionary, Kobe Eischeid became our Team Director. Kobe has spent his first three years as a missionary here at Iowa. We are thrilled to have him leading our team this year. Carly Colbert returned to campus for her second missionary year. This past summer, Carly got engaged and one of our new first year missionaries, Nathan Seiler is the man who proposed to her! Nathan is from southern Indiana, and he and Carly met while at Indiana University. We are excited to walk with them through their marriage preparation and wedding planning. They have set a date for February 2024. In addition to Nathan, we also welcomed two more first year missionaries: Alayna Moscinski and Caitlyn Dempsey. Alayna is from Ohio and

attended the University of Toledo. Caitlyn is from southern California has just moved to Iowa after graduating from Cal State-Fullerton! This is her first time in the midwest!



Each morning, our FOCUS missionary team and staff members gather for a team huddle to start our day. Each person shares what they have on their schedules and to-do list for the day and prayer intentions. Our missionaries begin their day with such things as run club and morning swim workouts, then head to the Newman Center for 8:30am rosary walk, then 9am holy hour. From there the day is filled with outreach and invitation to students - think dining halls,

meetings with Bible study leaders, students being formed through missionary discipleship. They spend time each week in team meetings, preparing for the Bible study groups that they lead, and stewarding their own mission partners. Many days, they are still 'on duty' into the evening hours: hosting gatherings at their homes, participating in events here at the Center, and assisting with post-Thursday Night Mass activities. As you can see, although our investment is significant to host a FOCUS team on campus, they are bold, loving, and unstoppable in the mission to help us make students commissioned disciples.

After not being involved through most of college, he recently began to be a Eucharistic Minister at 6pm Mass. He met a missionary at a beginning of the year bonfire at Newman. After going to a recruitment event in Madison, Wisconsin, he has felt a call to give his life to God in a deeper way and is considering becoming a missionary."

"FOCUS has helped me to understand who Jesus is and showed me what a relationship with Him looks like. Whether it's through our missionaries at The University of Iowa or the Bible studies that FOCUS offers, FOCUS has given me the resources I need to build my own relationship with Jesus and taught me how to incorporate Him into all aspects of my life. FOCUS has also given me the resources to bring Jesus to others and be able

to share my story with others. FOCUS has given me a community within the Newman Center that I did not ever think I would have. I have met my best friends through the Newman Center and that is because of what FOCUS has done on campus. Fr. Jeff hosted his annual Labor Day canoe trip for new students. Joined by our new FOCUS missionaries, over twenty students spent the day on the water with Fr. Jeff and crew. They enjoyed an outdoor Mass and lunch. One of the highlights of the year is participating in The University of Iowa's Homecoming. Over 100 students attended Thursday Night Student Mass (TNM) as we welcomed Fr. Max Carson, St. Albert High School Chaplain and Assistant Vocations Director, as well as two seminarians from the Diocese of Des

Moines. It was a Catholic homecoming as many students know him from his time at Dowling High School, St. Albert's High School, and from Catholic Youth Camp in Panora. After Mass over 80 students stayed for our first Homecoming Bonfire and S'Mores post-TNM event! As a recognized student organization on campus, the Homecoming Parade is a great way to create awareness for our

Newman Center in the community. This year's homecoming theme, the Golden Age, reminded us that our faith is more precious than gold.

Our students are dedicated to serving the community. One of the ways students serve is by hosting a Red Cross Blood Drive at the Center. Students assist with check-in and hosting the snack table for blood donors after giving blood. Over 30 donors gave blood here in September. We will host another drive on December 1, 2023. Students also enjoy serving at the Iowa City Catholic Worker House. There are many opportunities for them to serve by cooking a meal, visiting with guests, and doing projects around the house.



The UI Graduate Students and UI/UIHC Young Professionals group continues to thrive. We have seen great growth again this semester. Popular activities of the fall include: Bible studies, game nights and a weekly Rosary Walk at St. Joseph's Cemetery. A retreat is scheduled for this group in December 2023.

Making a connection between faith and culture is an important piece of what we do here in service to students. One of the ways we make this important connection is by celebrating traditional "color" masses in honor of different professional fields.

In early October, we hosted our first Red Mass to honor and pray for all legal professionals and students. Archbishop-Elect Thomas Zinkula presided at Mass and Tom Chapman, Executive Director of the Iowa Catholic Conference, spoke at the reception.

Later in the month, we hosted a celebration of our medical community in conjunction with our second annual White Mass and reception to honor and pray for all healthcare professionals. Fr. Joseph Sia presided at Mass with our local hospital chaplains; Fr. Terry Ball and Fr. Louis Hammond concelebrating.



November brings the opportunity to celebrate and honor all in the science fields during our second annual Gold Mass for Scientists.



Our student leadership program includes ten Fellows and nineteen Lead Team members serving across these area of ministry: liturgy and prayer, faith formation, service and social justice, advocacy, outreach, and communications. Each year, students apply for these leadership opportunities. Through the generosity of many financial partners who support various endowments, we are able to offer Fellows a stipend each year as well as funds to attend a conference or other training that pertains to their ministry area and the Catholic faith.

As part of their duties, Fellows manage a small team, called their Lead Team. These students make up our student leadership that we reference often. They are the "worker bees" of the Newman Center. This program offers many opportunities for students to not only engage in a meaningful way in their faith, but this opportunity also exposes them to important leadership, management, and planning skills.


22-23 Financial Report

For fiscal year 2022-2023, we were blessed to have 794 total donors financially support the Newman Catholic Student Center. This is an increase of 149 donors over the previous year. Our Development staff has been working hard to create awareness about our mission and need for support through communication, marketing, and outreach to alumni, parents, and others in our Catholic faith community. Campaigns like Giving Tuesday; Surround Support, Strengthen; and Newman Night Out 2023 were key events contributing to this growth.

Foundation of our Finances: Annual Fund and Offertory

The Annual Fund is the Newman Center's main funding stream and is mainly supported through our Founder's Club. In the past two fiscal years we have seen growth, however, we have still not reached levels to overcome the deficit in offertory giving created by the pandemic, although we are beginning to see that gap closing.

Our Offertory fund is an intergral part of our operating budget and relies heavily on gifts given at Mass, although we do have donors that give electronically to this fund. With our Mass attendance being primarily students, it is not surprising that our offertory averages only \$3040 per week. Although we are not back to pre-pandemic figures, we are seeing growth in our offertory gifts in each of the last two years.



Balancing growth with fluctuating income and expenses is a tough act. This past fiscal year, we were able to reduce expenses by an estimated \$27,000 over the previous fiscal year. Traditionally, year to year we see this fluctuation due to different activities, staffing changes, and needed facility maintenance/repairs. Throughout this newsletter, you can see through the stories we share that we are experiencing a time if great growth in the number of students that we serve. Your financial partnership makes our outreach on campus and our growth possible. Your financial stewardship is making an impact daily for students involved with the Newman Center.

Our operating expenses include everything we do- from student activities to utilities. When financial partners give unrestricted gifts to our Annual Fund, it allows us to determine how and where those funds are most needed at that time.

- Administration: office management supplies, phones, office equipment, salaries and employee benfits, professional development and training, VIRTUS safe environment requirements, postage, banking fees
- Student Programs: Welcome Week, retreats, post Thursday Night Mass, fellowship stipends, FOCUS missionary program, all student related events and supplies
- Facilities: all building maintenance, contracted services, furnishings, repairs, and supplies
- Liturgy and Music Ministry: musicians, Newman Singer tour expenses, singer stipends, music copyright licenses, hymnals, missals, altar flowers, candles, hosts, altar wines
- **Technology:** computers, all other technology equipment, software, networking, all maintenance and repair
- Communications and Development: non-student events, donor outreach events, campaign/appeal materials, donor database expense, postage, newsletter and other printing costs
- Newman Night Out: spring fundraiser event expenses- venue, meal, decorations, entertainment (Newman Singers), bank processing fees on credit card ticket sales and donations


